While NGOs work towards helping others, the NGO Mahila Milan at Byculla and Mumbai Central have devised ways to help themselves. "We have formed savings groups, negotiated with the state for our rights and for shelter planning both in terms of design and location. This process of united action has brought about important changes in relationships within our families and communities. For the first time in Mumbai, women have

emerged as community leaders," says Jockine, one of the founders of the group, which was established in the year 1984 and has 13 centres in the city.

The first centre, which was started in Mumbai Central has been successful as payement dwellers will now move into their new homes in Mankurd within the next six months. Fortunately, this organisation has no political connections, and the leaders are selected by the dwellers themselves. There is no hierarchy and all 11 of them are presidents. The money collected is deposited everyday at their centre in Mumbai Central. "This system has changed the lives of many in our street. They can acquire a loan from the centre to start their own business," says Bano Bi, of Water Street in Byculla. People can't misuse these funds since

Sion-based Bharat U helps find treatment for the destitute

In a city where pedestrians and motorists don't spare more than a glance at a destitute, there's one man who has dedicated his life to the homeless and even given them a new lease of life. Bharat U has been tracking the destitute for the last 15 years by driving around the city in his van. "The destitute are generally suffering from an illness and people tend to ignore them or pass them off as drunkards," says the retired business professional who operates around the Lokmanya Tilak Hospital, Sion.

It all started 15 years ago when he came across a helpless destitute. While he takes the destitute to various shelters and old-age homes, he doesn't like to get attached. "All I want to do is help these people, I am not doing any favour for them. Our duty ends at the gate of the respective NGO," explains Bharat, Having started all out on his own, Bharat now has a team of around 20 volunteers helping him in this endeavour. Sister Insanta of Asha Daan notes, "If it hadn't been for this man, the lives of the destitute wouldn't be saved. The volunteers are doing remarkable work, by picking up such people and giving us a chance to do something for them in return." Indeed!
